### Speaking to Kids

One opportunity I had during the month of April was to give the message at our bimonthly youth group. The youth group is run by two parents, and I, along with another teacher, help out. The format is pretty simple. Students assemble at a location between 6:00 - 7:00 PM and just hang out until everyone arrives. Around 7:00 we say grace and then share a meal together. After dinner one person gives a short "sermon" to illustrate some aspect of God's truth. Then games are played until 9:00 at which point the students go home. The entire evening is planned by students at a youth group steering committee meeting, which I also sit on.

Because this was the first time that I would address the youth group outside of school, I decided to start where any good speaker should: the beginning. Two years of teaching speech in Alaska taught me that every speaker first needs to establish ethos (prestige). In other words, I first needed to establish myself as a Christian before any of these students would take what I had to say to heart.

To achieve that goal I decided to give my testimony (the story of how I came to know Christ). To do that I decided to focus on three main events in my life: how I found God, how I came to know what a Christian was, and last, how I came to know and accept Christ. I spoke for seventeen minutes and used Philippians 3:10-11 as my theme, closing with Colossians 2:6-7.



#### **ACS Building Dedication**

Last year the American Cooperative School decided to add another wing to its building. In less than a year, record time, the building was completed. The new building includes four new classrooms, an atrium, and a conference room. Woods indigenous to Suriname were used to build the stairwells, and the whole building integrates seamlessly with the old.

After three school quarters of using the new building it was finally time to cut the ribbon and dedicate as an official part of the school. The head of the American Embassy, an official from the Suriname Chamber of Commerce, news reporters, and school board members were all invited. The building dedication was done on the same night as the Science Fair, Fine Arts Festival, and school Open House. It was a complete success and several perspective students showed up to see what ACS is all about. Praise God!
